Meeting called to order by Ron Averill, Chair, 9:02 AM

Opening Comments

General Turner

General Turner provided opening comments on behalf of General Daugherty.

Lava flows from the Kilauea volcano are causing problems with local communication. Some residents are refusing to evacuate. Letters are being issued to allow people into evacuated areas to assist but some are not assisting but are "disaster tourists" taking selfies in dangerous locations, creating issues for first responders.

EMD Remarks: Robert Ezelle

Robert noted that it continues to be a challenging year. The State Emergency Operations Center has been supporting Pend Oreille, Okanogan, and Ferry Counties in flood fighting efforts. EMD has been working with the Department of Ecology's Conservation Corps, Department of Corrections, and the Army Corp of Engineers with sandbagging efforts.

As the flood waters recede, the wildfires are starting. Benton County already has one state fire mobilization. Fire season could begin early this year and is predicted to be above normal. The above average snow pack is melting quickly and forecast for June through August shows it to be hot. This potentially could be a very busy and difficult situation this summer. Oregon is already experiencing significant issues due to extreme dryness.

E-911 migration to the network is progressing. About half a dozen successful cutovers have happened.

EMD is working on a very large and complex decision package to submit to the governor's office this fall hopefully to be included in the governor's budget.

FEMA Remarks:

Scott Zaffram, FEMA Region X

The 2017 hurricanes and wildfires overwhelmed FEMA this year. The takeaways from these incidents were:

- Expectation Management states helping states vs. relying on feds
- Florida, Houston, and Puerto Rico had 10- to 14-day response times.
- Try to get people to prepare and take appropriate action by knowing the details of their insurance information/coverage, etc.

The strategic goals:

- Help the nation's culture of preparedness
- FEMA Youth Preparedness Council (share/collaborate)
- Planning for catastrophic disasters
 - o Federal plans are not detailed enough.
 - o State and FEMA trying to sync plans.
 - o Working with all four states in Region X to prepare for Cascadia Rising 2022
 - o Power and Energy restoration priorities
- FEMA Integration Teams (FIT) want to partner with states and locals
 - o Want four or five-man teams (2019 rollout)
 - o Operations planner to sit with state planner

Governor's Office Jim Baumgart

- We are in an interim timeframe to review things
- Local jurisdictions not getting a break
 - o How do we change the dynamics to provide resiliency?
 - o Frustration/lack of capability (best practices)
 - o Need a place to put information for all to access and refer to in these situations

State Legislative Update

- Successful budget year
- Vulnerability testing cyber networks
- Strategic plan and Continuity of Government (COG) bills
 - o Republicans didn't want possible infringement of second amendment rights
 - o Democrats didn't want the vote on this issue to delay the larger issue of getting the supplemental budget approved
 - o The COG bill has nothing to do with weapons amendments out of scope
 - Did not pass
- For the 2018 session EMD is developing a WA State Disaster Assistance program to help families in the event of disaster
 - Wildfires/flooding they we have had over the past few years has not reached a level that qualifies for federal assistance
- Five proposed decision packages in review: going over packages, going to start external vetting
 - The military is developing strategies on how we are going to educate the members of the legislature, so they understand the implications of what we are asking for.
 - o Recognize limitations/ scope... how do we cover gap? What is role/function of governor to close gap?

• Seismic Safety (SS)

Dan Banks for Dave Norman

- o The full Seismic Safety Committee (SSC) has not met since the last EMC meeting
- Several SSC sub committees have met several times since February, including the Resilient Washington's subcommittee, the School Seismic Safety Subcommittee and meetings to discuss the Governor's Results Washington as it pertains to geological hazards and school seismic safety.
- The SSC has had many discussions related to the Resilient Washington subcabinet and moving forward with that Initiative.
- The SSC plan going forward is to continue to focus on Resilient WA implementation, School seismic safety implementation, Earthquake Early Warning, and unreinforced masonry buildings (URM)
- We are working with Office of the Insurance Commissioner and others on a study bill to make recommendations for natural hazards insurance needs in the state.
- o DNR received \$1.2 million in the Capital Budget funding for doing school seismic safety and the SSC has established an advisory group to help guide the work. This will fund the initial evaluation of some schools to determine site conditions and engineering needs.
- The date of the next full SSC meeting is August 24, 2018.

• Emergency Management Advisory Group (EMAG)

- The full EMAG has not met since February 1
- o Workgroup is working on how we define emergency management at all levels
- o Survey was conducted to find strengths and to assist with filling gaps
- o Survey purpose was to self-assess local capability against EMAP standard
- Meeting again next week to review survey results

Infrastructure Resilience Subcommittee (IRSC)

- Special emphasis on the lifeline sectors of communications, power, water, and waste water
- o Membership is up to 140 partners, and growing

Inclusion and Equity Subcommittee (IES)

IES facilitated a meeting on March 30 in follow-up to the January 11 IES meeting with EMD, ODHH, and the Coalition for Inclusive Emergency Preparedness led by the Washington State Independent Living Council.

The meeting centered on review of the January 11 recommendations to support implementation of SB5046 and identification of potential opportunities, challenges, resource needs, and prioritization of collaborative objectives moving forward.

The following recommendations were identified for further planning considerations with EMD. A meeting will be scheduled by EMD to continue conversation with all four partners. Date pending.

- o Recommendation: Advocate for broad interpretation regarding SB-5046 policies and procedures.
- o Recommendation: Consider universal communication approach in strategy.
- o **Recommendation**: Integrate CIEP/IES members' feedback and involvement into "EMD's Outreach Strategy" around SB-5046 and other communication activities.

On April 12, IES met via video conference with the purpose to update members of activities since January 11.

o Invited guest, Christina Rocks from the Washington State Department of Health, provided a summary on statewide workshops focused on developing Crisis Standards of Care using a community-based participatory model. Rocks focused on sharing best practices how to engage and provide support for a whole-community approach to emergency preparedness and planning.

The next meeting of the IES will be rescheduled for August due to conflicts with the July 4 holiday.

2017 Report to the Governor

2017-18 Charter Review/Vote

- During the Charter review discussion, two minor errors were pointed out by the membership. Dan Banks incorporated those into the draft.
 - Changing the title Washington State Association of Fire Chiefs to its proper title of Washington State
 Fire Chiefs Association
 - o Changed the name of the Whole Community to Inclusion and Equity Subcommittee.
- Dan Banks briefed everyone on the proposed change to the Law Enforcement representation on the EMC.
 They were the only functional area that had two positions on the EMC. The proposed charter will change that to one, to aligned Law Enforcement with all other areas. This was coordinate with WSAPC and the Sheriffs associations. The new representation follows.
 - o Primary = Pierce County Sheriff, Paul Pastor
 - o Secondary = Fife Chief of Police, Pete Fisher
- Changes to charter = 2 title changes
- The membership voted on and approved the Charter changes.

2018 EMC/SAC Meeting Preparations

- Construction of the Senior Advisory Committee is an issue due to the large number of people/disciplines needing to be included)
 - o Dan Banks has developed a tentative agenda and is working with John Ufford to develop an invitee list to the October 4 EMC/SAC meeting. Invitations will be sent in early July.
