- a. State Enhanced 9-1-1 Coordination Office (SECO) [00:06:11] Adam Wasserman
  - 1) February 16th, 2018 is the 50th anniversary of the first 9-1-1 call.
  - 2) Importance of a resilient 9-1-1 system that can take on new technology in light of the recent event that occurred in Parkland Florida. Mr. Adam Wasserman expresses his thanks and gratitude to call takers, counties and AC Attendees.
  - 3) Spoke about AC Briefing. Please forward any feedback to the State Office. These will take place every month that an in-person meeting is not being held.
  - 4) Two ESInet (Emergency Services IP Network) are connected. Currently conducting testing which will run through April. Thank you to Century Link, Comcast and everyone else who is making the transition possible.
  - 5) Budget is still working its way through the House and Senate. It looks like the session will end on time. We will get the first glance at the outcome on Monday. Waiting to hear more on Proviso rewrite from Representative Morris.
  - 6) Travis Bill, we have a very rough RFI out for team review. We are hoping for a solid RFI by early March.
  - 7) State Office is short one more position; Mr. Randy Unger decided to retire back in November. Which means we are short 4 positions which will not be filled until after we have made it through this budget crisis to save as much money as we can. We appreciate your patience.
  - 8) SharePoint transition. Addressed frustrations and expressed the importance of making sure to update emails.

b. 9-1-1 Communications [00:15:43]

Rebecca Beaton

- 1) Communications subcommittee met last week.
- 2) Membership, we are currently a small subcommittee and would like others to join.
- 3) FCC Reports: Issue between Neustar and iconectiv (Telcordia) concerning national number porting (???) vendor. Transition is to be completed by May 2018. Testing is currently happening, vendors must come up with a rollback priority plan in the event that the transition is unable to take place.
- 4) Other three items reviewed
  - Coordination of outages and reporting.
  - Grade of service for 911 in WA state.
  - Schedule for 2018 meetings which will be set at the March 2018 meeting.

c. Next Generation 9-1-1 (NG9-1-1) [00:18:39]

Katy Myers

- 1) Met yesterday in Thurston County.
- 2) Next Generation has two working groups.
  - Security Update Tiger Team- Made no progress with security updates so far. We believe the deadline for the plan might be extended since the grant application has not been posted yet. Original plan was to have the plan updated by the end of March. According to Mr. Adam Wasserman (State Enhanced 9-1-1 Coordination Office) the Grant is waiting on final rules from OMB (Office of Management and Budget.) Should know more by Spring 2018. We want to make sure we are following the proper security standards.
  - Next Generation Update group- Met twice on the phone, and had a meeting yesterday where we presented the group and got more information. So far, we have an outline for the Next Generation plan and sections have been assigned to various members to draft wording. Yesterday we had a lot of good discussion. We want to make sure everyone is in agreement on what the plan is and is not. Our interpretation of the Next Gen Plan is a vision for what Next Generation looks like in the state of Washington. Not just an implementation plan for the ESInet II (Emergency Services IP Network.) Other sections include current status, short term goals, and long-term goals. There are many sections and topics we will be digging into; like features and functions, committee will educate and get feedback. We discussed how we would implement the features and functions, prioritize what features and functions we would want to enable, and location accuracy is what we would like to see implemented and working right away. At our next meeting will be learning about location accuracy and what that looks like in a Next Generation environment so we can speak to it with some education behind it. We have added some sections on Public Education and Training. The work group does not want to involve the Public Education or Training subcommittees until they have had some time to come up with plans and ideas. [00:20:44]
  - Policy Routing Rules related directly to the ESInet II project, which is time sensitive. The rules are there to support the policy routing function of the ESInet. The function handles the diversion of calls due to outages or excessive call

volumes. They define where calls will be transferred. The standard for NENA (National Emergency Number Association) about policy routing rules STA-003.1.1. We agreed as a committee that we would try to read through it.

- Next meeting on March 13th 9am-12pm in Thurston County.
- Question regarding those policies and protocols routing and rerouting of calls do we have a mechanism to enforce some of that if it depends on the CPE (Customer Premises Equipment) vendors to customize or tweak their software?
  - ✓ We do not as far as I am aware of, that is what our discussion was about. Our idea was to establish a quality assurance control, not an approval board, but a group that you would submit your plans to and they would make sure there is not negative that could happen based on that plan and also provide input on how you could improve the plan.
- Mr. Andy Leneweaver asked if Ms. Myers would speak to the discussion about MOAs (Memorandum of Agreements) for routing?
  - ✓ We will discuss that in the coordinators meeting.

d. Policy [00:28:34]

Richard Kirton

- 1) Met a couple times since the last AC (Advisory Committee) meeting.
- 2) Developed draft contingency plans in case we do not get the supplemental appropriation. We have shared those with the coordinators, but they really provide a range based on four potential scenarios. Right now, it is information for coordinators to begin planning and talk with legislators regarding impacts to counties. We do not have a final recommendation yet, we need to see how this supplemental will play out before we can pick a final option.
- 3) Discussed equipment contracts, we are waiting on a legal opinion from the state before we can move forward with any recommendations on those.
- 4) We have appointed a workgroup to help the state with the application for the federal grant.

f. Geographic Information System (GIS) [00:31:20]

- 1) Subcommittee has moved to every other month in light of the view that our time is better spent working toward the ESInet transition.
- 2) The second public review on the NENA GIS Data Model has gone out. Which means we are very near the conclusion and publication of the NENA (National Emergency Number Association) data model.
- 3) Still negotiating where we will be having our meeting. Original plan was to have it at the WAURISA GIS conference but plans may change due to communication issues.
- 4) Most counties are well on track for the December 2018 deadline to have their data at a 0 (zero) critical error level. We are still working with GeoComm and Comtech to figure out some of the false positive errors that counties are receiving. Most counties with an exception to maybe 2 or 3 are at a very manageable critical error level.
- 5) GIS Subcommittee would like to request that the NG9-1-1 (Next Generation 9-1-1) subcommittee reach out to them regarding the transition and NENA (National Emergency Number Association) documents. GIS is a big component in NG9-1-1.

- 1) Physical meeting changed last minute to phone conference due to fallen officer Deputy McCartney, as well as the recent Dupont train derailment. Great attendance. Want to continue talking about LEP (Limited English Proficiency) 911 brochures. We currently have 10-12 different language brochures with the same talking points already created.

## VII. State Office Reports

- a. Fiscal Reports [00:53:12] Suzette Vik
- 1) The report includes all expenses through December 2017. This report is for the current fiscal year. We are about 6 months into the year, and are expected to be at 50 percent. Just as a reminder, the bold numbers at the top of each category is just a total of each. Ms. Suzette Vik summarized the report by category. Ending Account balance for the State Office as of December 31st, 2017 is \$3,693,300.00 after all expenditures.
- b. ESInet II Report [00:55:23] Andy Leneweaver
- 1) Transition status, both ESInet (Emergency Services IP Network) are connected to each other. They have been tested and found to be working. Comtech and Century Link are going down each channel of connections to verify that they are working. It is on schedule as expected.
  - 2) Camp Murray test PSAP (Public-Safety Answering Point) gained Military Dept. CIO (Chief Information Officer) approval last night. We now have a green light to have that installed. Installation will begin next week. Zetron and Comtech has provided service and equipment free to the State.

- 3) Kick off meeting for the King County test PSAP, which will occur next week. No issues expected.
- 4) On target for Rivercom to be the first PSAP to move over to the new ESInet.
- 5) Introduced Mr. Greg Pittsford, who took over for Ms. Courtney Wilson as the State's dedicated account representative. Mr. Pittsford spoke to his previous professional history.
- 6) Ms. Shae Shaffer gave a brief on kick off calls. Please read your Migrations Guides. [00:58:31]
- 7) Questions: [01:01:00]
  - Mr. Richard Kirton- Will the conversation with NoaNet include route details?
    - ✓ The Migration Guide has diagrams they are not specific for the PSAP, but if you have any questions you can reach out to Ms. Shaffer and she will get answers from NoaNet. Yes, NoaNet will share with you the routing of your circuits 90 days before cutover.
    - ✓ Mr. Kirton expresses that he would like to see routing details much sooner than 90 days out. Mr. Tim Lenk concurred with Mr. Kirton.
  - Mr. Richard Kirton- Can we get routing details sent out to all the counties now?
    - ✓ We can check with NoaNet.
  - Ms. Deanna Wells- Do we have any feedback on the assessments provided by Comtech and NoaNet last year?
    - ✓ Ms. Shaffer- one of the things we will be reviewing in the kickoff is the workbook that we went over when we did your original site survey. We realize that because it has been so long, there could be a lot of changes; so, one of the things we are doing is, in the invite, I will send a copy of the workbook. I will highlight any of the information that we need to validate. There are few new questions we will need to have answered by your CPE (Customer Premises Equipment) vendor. Comtech has written an email as well as a list of items you will need to provide to them so we can get those answers during the kick off.
    - ✓ Ms. Wells expressed concern with the timeline. 90 days would not be enough to address issues.
    - ✓ Mr. Andy Leneweaver- Apologized for not having sent out highlights of site survey yet.
  - Mr. Andy Leneweaver- There are three (3) counties that the state has yet to receive NDAs. The reason the NDA is so important is because some of the information disclosed in the Migration Guide is not subject to Public Information. If we hand that information out to an entity without a non-disclosure agreement in place, the state would be in violation of the State Public Records Act.
    - ✓ Mr. Ray Maycumber- expresses concern with 90-day timeline.
  - Ms. Deanna Wells (?)- asks if she will need a signed letter from her CPE Vendor.
    - ✓ Mr. Andy Leneweaver- While the state only enters into non-disclosure agreement with the county, in many cases a counties CPE Vendor will need the information provided in the migration guide. Protecting the information provided by the state is the responsibility of the county, when it comes to information sharing with other entities. The county must protect the information as set in the terms of the NDA with WA State, by directly entering an NDA with their perspective CPE Vendors.
- 8) Mr. Steve Walsh gives IT brief. [01:09:18]
  - Update on status of SharePoint.
  - The State Office and Comtech are working with The Department of Homeland Security to conduct a security evaluation of the ESInet II. This is a free service for critical infrastructure of federal and local governments. PSAPs can take part if they would like. For more information contact Mr. Steve Walsh.

- a. Association of APCO (Association of Public-Safety Communications Officials)/NENA (National Emergency Number Association) Keith Flewelling
- 1) APCO is tracking SB 5970. This bill authorizes two pilot programs, set up and managed by WASPC (Washington Association of Sheriffs and Police Chiefs,) to look at law enforcement response to mental health situations. The pilot would enable law enforcement to team up with mental health at various stages of an incident to better affect the outcome of those calls. APCO/NENA is trying to include a PSAP (Public-Safety Answering Point) as part of the pilot program so the upstream effect of mental health responses can begin with a PSAP (Public-Safety Answering Point) rather than in the field response. This bill is on a fast track and probably will end up on the governor's desk at the end of session.
  - 2) Also working very hard on the supplemental budget.
