## SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

17-1908	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>On August 8, Pierce County Department of Emergency Management (DEM) reopened a mission to search for a 46 year old man fisherman who had possibly drowned in the Puyallup River. Search dogs were coordinated from Snohomish and King Counties to assist.</li> <li>On August 10, Pierce County DEM closed this mission. Nothing was found.</li> </ul>
17-2380	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>On August 1, Skamania County continued their search for a missing 90 year old male with dementia initiated on June 30.</li> <li>On July 28, Skamania County requesting additional SAR resources for another search on August 6. Clark County provided 4 search dogs and 13 ground searchers. The search was closed at 2300 on August 6 with nothing found.</li> </ul>
17-2535	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>On July 8, Olympic National Park requested Olympic Mountain Rescue (OMR) for the rescue of an injured hiker on Scotts Bluff. An asset request was placed with Kitsap County. OMR sent 3-4 personnel to support this mission. The subject was successfully recovered.</li> </ul>
17-2705	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>On July 19, the Washington Department of Transportation requested a mission number to cover activation of their departmental EOC during the total eclipse on August 21.</li> <li>On August 21 at 0800, the State EOC elevated to Level 2 to monitor eclipse related incidents in the state. The EOC returned to Level 3 at 1400 hours with no major incident reported.</li> </ul>
17-2864	<p>This heat event continued from July. The following National Weather Service (NWS) products remained in effect or were issued on or after August 1:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>On August 1, an Excessive Heat Warning remained in effect from noon, August 1, until 2300, August 4, for Clark, Cowlitz, Pacific, Skamania, Wahkiakum, Kitsap, Thurston, Lewis, Snohomish, Mason, Grays Harbor, Pierce, King, and Jefferson Counties.</li> <li>On August 1, a Red Flag Warning for very hot, dry and significantly unstable conditions for the west slopes of the Cascades and much of Southwest Washington affecting Clark, Cowlitz, Wahkiakum, Pacific, Skamania, Lewis, Pierce, King, Snohomish, Skagit, and Whatcom Counties went into effect at 1100 and remained until 2300, August 3. Additionally, a Fire Weather Watch remained in place for Puget Sound lowland areas affecting portions of King, Pierce, Thurston, Lewis, Grays Harbor, Mason, Kitsap, and Jefferson counties in effect from the morning of August 2 to the evening of August 3.</li> <li>On August 1, the NWS issued a Red Flag Warning for very hot and dry conditions in the Olympic Mountains of Clallam, Jefferson, Grays Harbor, and Mason Counties in effect until 2300, August 3.</li> <li>On August 2, the NWS cancelled the Fire Weather Watch for the Puget Sound Lowlands and issued a Red Flag Warning for very hot and dry conditions for the Black Hills and SW Interior Lowlands affecting Mason, Grays Harbor, Thurston and Lewis Counties in effect from 1400 to 2300, August 3.</li> <li>On August 2, the NWS issued a Fire Weather Watch in effect from late Friday morning until Friday evening for the Okanogan Valley affecting Okanogan and Douglas Counties.</li> </ul>

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• On August 3, the NWS issued a Red Flag Warning for wind and low relative humidity which was in effect from 1000-2100, August 4, which cancelled the Fire Weather Watch affecting Okanogan and Douglas Counties.</li> <li>• On August 3, the NWS issued a Fire Weather Watch for the West Slopes of the North Cascades, generally above 1500 feet, which was in effect from Friday morning through Friday evening, for Whatcom, Skagit, Snohomish, and King Counties.</li> <li>• On August 3, the National Weather Service issued a Red Flag Warning for the west slopes of the North Cascades until 2300, August 4, replacing the Fire Weather Watch. The NWS also extended the Red Flag Warning for the west slopes of the Central Cascades until 2300, August 4, for very hot, dry and unstable conditions affecting Whatcom, Skagit, Snohomish, King, Pierce and Lewis Counties. These Warnings were cancelled on August 4.</li> <li>• On August 4, the NWS issued a Red Flag Warning for the East Slopes of the Southern Washington Cascades in Klickitat County in effect from 1400-2100 that day. All warnings expired with no further incidents.</li> </ul>
17-2882	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• On July 30, Yakima County requested a fire mobilization for the Glade 3 fire near Mabton. The fire was 5000 acres and growing at the time of the request with level 3 evacuations underway. The request was approved at 1930 and the State EOC moved to Level 2 activation as a result with an EOC Supervisor and ESF 4 activated and operating remotely. The mobilization remained in effect at the end of July.</li> <li>• On August 2, Yakima County fire mobilization for the Glade 3 fire ended. The Washington State EOC returned to Level 3, Monitoring.</li> </ul>
17-2904	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• On August 1, King County Sheriff's Office requested cell phone forensics to assist in locating an overdue hiker. Resources were coordinated from the Air Force Rescue Coordination Center. Additional request for Ground Searchers (GSAR), Mountain Rescue, 4x4 and quad vehicles were requested from Snohomish, Pierce, Whatcom, Kittitas, Thurston, Lewis, Skagit and Kitsap. Kittitas provided search dogs and quads, Kitsap provided mountain rescue, and Thurston provided ground searchers and 4x4 vehicles.</li> <li>• On August 1, King County Sheriff's Office requested additional support for August 2. 4x4/quads, Mountain Rescue, GSAR, Trackers and IST support were requested from Snohomish, Pierce, Whatcom, Kittitas, Thurston, Lewis, Skagit and Kitsap Counties.</li> <li>• On August 2, King County requested OMR/TMR, ground searchers and Everett Mountain Rescue. Kitsap, Pierce and Snohomish Counties were contacted for support.</li> <li>• On August 3, King County reported the hiker was found and transported to Swedish Medical Center with minor injuries.</li> </ul>
17-2914	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• On August 1, Clallam County Sheriff's Office requested a dive team to assist in a body recovery in Neah Bay. Kitsap, Mason, Thurston and Pierce Counties were contacted to support this mission. On August 2, Clallam County reported the body was recovered.</li> </ul>

Fechner, a 16 month old white female last seen at Mead and suspected to be in the custody of her biological father, David W Reed. The Amber Alert was cancelled later the same day when both subjects were located.</li> </ul>
17-2940	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>On August 2, Yakima County Sheriff's Office requested a helicopter with Forward Looking Infrared (FLIR) to assist in the search for a missing disabled hiker on Mt. Adams. Local resources were not available and the Air Force Rescue Coordination Center (AFRCC) was contacted to coordinate federal assets from Yakima Training Center. The disabled climber was found and taken to Memorial Hospital to be treated for hypothermia.</li> </ul>
17-2942	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>On August 2, Chief John Batiste authorized State Mobilization for the Knotgrass Fire in Garfield &amp; Asotin Counties, near Pomeroy. The State Emergency Operations Center (EOC) activated to Level 2 at that time. Only the EOC Supervisor position and Emergency Support Function (ESF) 4 (Firefighting) were activated. ESF 4 worked remotely from the Olympia Office.</li> <li>On August 4, the Knotgrass Fire State Mobilization ended at 1700. State Activation Level remained at a Level Two in support of the Hayes Road Fire in Douglas County.</li> </ul>
17-2946	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>On August 2, Chief John Batiste authorized State Mobilization for the Malden Fire in Whitman County, near Malden. Homes, crops, timber, and power lines were threatened. Level 2 evacuations were place for 10 homes in the area. Only the EOC Supervisor position and ESF 4 (Firefighting) were activated. ESF 4 worked remotely from the Olympia Office.</li> <li>On August 4, the Malden Fire State Mobilization ended at 1900. State Activation Level remained at a Level Two in support of the Hayes Road Fire in Douglas County.</li> </ul>
17-2971	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>On August 4, the Clallam County Sheriff's Office opened a SAR mission for a missing female mushroom picker whose vehicle was located at the intersection of Mary Clark Road and US 101 along the Sol Duc River in Forks, WA. Sgt. Hollis requested air assets to run a search pattern, but the request was denied by King and Snohomish Counties due to inclement atmospheric conditions and the area to be searched was too imprecise.</li> <li>On August 5, the Clallam County Sheriff's Office called the EOC to again request air support. They had located the missing female subject on the opposite of the Sol Duc River which was inaccessible to the Swift Water Rescue team. SNOPAC agreed to fly the mission. The subject was picked up and flown to the hospital.</li> </ul>
17-2977	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>On August 4, a request for State Fire Mobilization was received for the Hayes Road Fire in Douglas County. At the time of request, the size was 500 acres and growing utilizing sage, grass, and crops as fuel. Level 3 evacuations were in place with an estimated 12 homes threatened. Fire Mobilization was approved at 1745 by Chief John Batiste. The State EOC was already at Level 2 due to the Malden Fire.</li> </ul>

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>The State Fire Resources Mobilization ended at 0800 on August 7 and the State EOC returned to Level 3, Monitoring.</li> </ul>
17-2996	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>On August 5, the Olympic National Park requested 4 mountain rescue volunteers to search for two overdue hikers in the Mount Constance area of the park. Olympic Mountain Rescue (OMR) from Kitsap County responded with two mountain rescue volunteers. The hikers made it home safe before OMR responded.</li> </ul>
17-3014	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>On August 6, the IERCC called reporting a SPOT activation on the Pacific Crest Trail near Holman Pass. A helicopter with Forward Looking Infrared (FLIR) was requested however there were no crews available.</li> <li>On August 7, direct coordination was made with the Custom and Border Patrol. However, their helicopter was not successful in locating the subject. The Air Force Rescue Coordination Center was contacted and a Blackhawk helicopter with hoist assisted. The man was later found in good condition at Hearts Pass and had accidentally activated his beacon.</li> </ul>
17-3015	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>On August 6, Chelan County Sheriff's Office initiated a rescue of a hiker with a head injury on Mt. Stewart. Local Resources were not available so AFRCC was contacted to coordinate resources from Navy Whidbey. Subject was rescued and transported to Harborview Medical Center for treatment.</li> </ul>
17-3027	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>On August 7, Yakima County conducted a rescue of a 57 year-old male with broken ribs on the face of False Summit on Mt Adams. A helicopter with hoist was coordinated from the Yakima Training Center for assistance. The subject was transported to the Yakima Regional Hospital for treatment.</li> </ul>
17-3028	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>On August 7, Kent Sisson requested a mission number for the rescue of a climber stuck on the face of Mt. Stuart. Pre-coordination was made with Navy Whidbey for a helicopter with hoist and the subject was extracted successfully.</li> </ul>
17-3082	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>On August 10, the NWS issued a fire weather watch for most of the counties in Eastern Washington due to abundant dry lightning and gusty winds, in effect from August 11 through August 12 evening.</li> <li>On August 11, The NWS issued a Red Flag Warning, replacing the Fire Weather Watch for Asotin, Columbia, Garfield and Walla Walla Counties. The National Weather Service cancelled the Fire Weather Watch for Okanogan County.</li> <li>On August 11, the NWS issued a Red Flag Warning for scattered thunderstorms and dry conditions in effect from 0500-1100, August 12, affecting Chelan, Douglas, Yakima, Kittitas, Grant, Adams, and Lincoln Counties.</li> <li>On August 12, The Fire Weather Watch expired for Klickitat, Benton and Franklin Counties and the Red Flag Warning expired for Chelan, Douglas, Yakima, Kittitas, Grant, Adams, and Lincoln Counties.</li> <li>The remaining Red Flag Warning for Asotin, Columbia, Garfield, and Walla Walla Counties was cancelled at 2132, August 12, ending this weather event.</li> </ul>

After de-energizing the power line the fire was contained. No Hanford facilities were threatened. DOE Hanford terminated this event later in the day.</li> </ul>
17-3115	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>On August 12, Mt. Rainier Dispatch initiated a rescue of two injured hikers on Emmons Marine Trail. The Air Force Rescue Coordination Center was contacted for a Blackhawk helicopter with hoist, however the on-scene coordinator cancelled this request. The subjects were safely packed out that evening by National Park Rangers.</li> </ul>
17-3117	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>On August 12, Yakima County Sheriff's Office opened a search for a 56 year old male hiker overdue from a day hike in the Waterworks Canyon area. A helicopter with FLIR capability was requested through the AFRCC. The subject was found deceased the following day by a military helicopter and recovered.</li> </ul>
17-3118	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>On August 12, Grant County requested State Fire Mobilization for the East Saddle Mountain fire near Othello. The fire was 5,000 acres and growing at the time of the request with level 3 evacuations underway. The mobilization was approved as of 2045 that day and the State EOC moved to Level 2 activation with an EOC Supervisor and ESF 4 activated and operating remotely.</li> <li>On August 15, Mobilization ended at 1600 and the State EOC resumed Level 3 operations at 1900.</li> </ul>
17-3122	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>On August 13, DOE Hanford reported an Abnormal Event for a 200 acre fire burning on Hanford Reach National Monument Land near State Route 24. The event was terminated later in the day after the fire was extinguished on the monument land. No Hanford facilities were threatened.</li> </ul>
17-3133	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>On August 14, Lower Columbia Region Fire Coordinator requested a State Fire Mobilization for the Hult Butte Fire located in Kittitas County near Vantage, which was approved at 0145. The fire was 500 acres and growing with homes, cellular tower, and infrastructure threatened. Level 1 evacuations were in place for 32 homes.</li> <li>The mobilization ended that evening at 1900. The State EOC was already at Level 2 for the East Saddle Mountain Fire in Grant County during the term of this event.</li> </ul>
17-3141	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>On August 14, Mason County opened a search for a missing hiker on Mount Eleanor. Mountain rescue resources from Olympic Mountain Rescue in Kitsap County were contacted to assist in the search. The subject was safely located that morning.</li> </ul>
17-3151	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>On August 15, Lewis County initiated a rescue of three injured hikers on Pacific Crest Trail. A helicopter with hoist was coordinated from King County. The subjects were safely rescued by King County.</li> </ul>
17-3158	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>On August 16, The Olympic National Park conducted a rescue of a man and two teenagers on the north Skykomish Trail. Olympic Mountain Rescue was contacted to assist. The subjects walk out on their own in good condition the following day.</li> </ul>

The second hiker, deceased, was recovered on August 20 with helicopter assistance from Snohomish County.</li> </ul>
17-3225	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>On August 21, Skamania County initiated a search for a missing 15 year-old female with a mental disability. A search helicopter was requested from King County. Skamania County called later saying a helicopter company was contacted directly by the Sheriff and state resources were cancelled. Skamania County then requested 25-50 ground searchers, 5 dog teams and 1 helicopter. Resource requests were made with Pierce, Snohomish, King, Cowlitz and Clark Counties for August 22.</li> <li>On the morning of August 22, the subject was found in good health. Additional SAR assets were then cancelled or turned back.</li> </ul>
17-3228	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>On August 21, the NWS issued a Fire Weather Watch for Asotin, Columbia, Garfield and Walla Walla. On August 22, the NWS upgraded the Fire Weather Watch for these counties to a Red Flag Warning.</li> <li>On August 23, the NWS issued a Red Flag Warning for Chelan and Douglas Counties.</li> <li>All Warnings ended during the evening of August 23 without further incident.</li> </ul>

At the time of approval, the fire was approximately 100 acres and growing, homes were threatened, and evacuations orders were being established. The State EOC elevated to Phase 2 at the time of approval in support of the mobilization.</li> <li>The fire demobilized at 1500 hours on August 28. There being no other state fire mobilizations in effect at that time, the State EOC reduced activation back to Level 3, Monitoring.</li> </ul>
17-3345	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>On August 28, Yakima County Sheriff's Office requested a helicopter with Hoist to assist in the search for a missing hiker on Mt. Adams. Local resources were not available so AFRCC was contacted to coordinate federal assets from the Yakima Training Center which subsequently deployed a helicopter to fly the mission. The mission remained open until the next day because the subject wanted to ascend the mountain again in order to retrieve his equipment.</li> </ul>
17-3363	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>On August 30, the NWS issued a Red Flag Warning for Thunderstorms affecting Spokane, Pend Oreille, and Stevens Counties from 1100-1800 that day. The Warning was cancelled at 1457 that day when lightning failed to develop as expected.</li> <li>On August 30, The NWS issued a Red Flag Warning for gusty winds and low humidity affecting Kittitas, Klickitat &amp; Benton Counties from 1400-2100 that day. The Warning expired without incident.</li> <li>On August 30, the NWS issued a Red Flag Warning for wind and low humidity affecting Yakima and Kittitas Counties in effect from 1300-2000 hours that day. The Warning expired without incident.</li> <li>On August 30, the NWS issued an Excessive Heat Watch for areas between the coast and the Cascades in Clark, Cowlitz, Pacific, Skamania and Wahkiakum Counties.</li> <li>On August 31, the NWS issued a Fire Weather Watch from Saturday morning through Monday evening for hot, dry and unstable conditions for portions of Cowlitz, Clark, Skamania, Klickitat, and Yakima Counties. Hot, dry, and unstable conditions expected due to relative humidity of 15-25%, mid-level Haines of 6 and high level Haines of 5 and 6.</li> <li>On August 31, NWS has issued a Heat Advisory in effect from 1400 Saturday to 2200 Tuesday for Clark, Cowlitz, Pacific, Skamania, and Wahkiakum Counties. *Test information/definitions:*

- **NAWAS:** National Warning System Tests (NAWAS) over the State and Federal circuits. NAWAS connects over 1,800 State and Federal jurisdictions and agencies on the Federal circuit and all counties, some agencies and some tribes on the State circuit. There are four tests a day, two state and two federal, testing 66 drops on two circuits. The number above reflects the four tests a day. Previously the number included the total number of stations contacted during those tests.
- **DOE tests:** Department of Energy Hanford Site has a dedicated phone and fax line into the EOC and they are tested at least weekly. Only the voice phone line numbers are reported here
- **CGS tests:** Columbia Generating Station has a dedicated phone and fax line into the EOC and they are tested at least weekly. Only the voice phone line numbers are reported here.
- **AHAB:** All Hazards Alert Broadcast System is tested daily through the daily function tests, which tests the functional capability of all coastal and Puget Sound siren systems. The voice and tone sirens are tested monthly. The AHAB Siren activates the coastal and Puget Sound voice and tone sirens during tsunami and other hazardous incidents.
- **OPSCAN:** Olympic Peninsula Public Safety Alliance Network (OPSCAN) connects public safety organizations throughout the Olympic Peninsula.
- **STAEN:** The State Agency Emergency Network (STAEN) connects state agency via an 800 MHz radio system.
- **CEMNET:** Comprehensive Emergency Management Network radio connecting all counties and many cities via Zetron Radio Console.
- **King County 800 MHz System** connects the Alert and Warning Center with King County key emergency management and response organizations.
