## **I. Call to Order** [AC Meeting May 2018]

JoAnn Boggs

- a. Chair JoAnn Boggs called the Washington State Enhanced 9-1-1 Advisory Committee (AC) meeting to order at 10:05 a.m.

## **III. Advisory Committee Member Changes**

- a. Ms. Boggs welcomes Ms. Catie Holstein with the Department of Health (DOH), and Chief Tim McKern with the Washington Fire Chiefs (WFC).

## **IV. Approval of Minutes from Last Meeting**

- a. Mr. Keith Flewelling Representing NENA (National Emergency Number Association) moved that the minutes be approved with revisions adding Rick Anderson (Stevens) to the Attendance and in Section 4 removing “APCO” from Mr. Keith Flewelling’s title. Criselia Grupp (Chelan) seconded the motion, motion carried, minutes approved. [00:08:04]

## **V. Old Business**

- a. State Enhanced 9-1-1 Coordination Office (SECO) [00:09:50] Adam Wasserman
  - 1) ESInet (Emergency Services IP Network) transition continues. Mr. Andy Leneweaver will have more details later in the meeting.
  - 2) Decision Package- In the middle of writing a decision package at the State Office for next biennium’s budget. Looking out at our forecasted budget--without cuts to the CPD, our revenue will meet our projected budget; but, we still need to develop a decision package to ask to spend our own money.
  - 3) Travis Alert Act- Team has met. We are now working on the report. The consensus of the group is it would be feasible to provide the type of information needed to support the Travis Alert Act. We are currently developing a report for the legislature that will include a cost of implementing the bill, which would have to be added to our budget.
  - 4) State Audit- E911 State Office passed the audit and received a “State Auditors’ Stewardship award. Congratulation to Ms. Teresa Lewis, Ms. Lisa Barbier, and Ms. Sharon Lotonuu, for all the work they have done since the last audit in 2015.

## **VI. Subcommittee Reports**

- a. 9-1-1 Authorities [00:12:22] Brenda Cantu
  - 1) Committee continues to meet every month.
  - 2) Communications Plan was approved in July and was emailed out to everyone on August 15th, 2018. Along with the Communications Plan, a copy of the Frequently Asked Questions and the Stakeholders List were attached for you to review. Please review the Stakeholder list and make sure your email is correct and see if there is anyone we should be adding. All feedback should be directed to the Authorities Subcommittee Chair, Ms. Brenda Cantu (Grays Harbor) via email.

- 3) During previous meetings, Mr. Adam Wasserman attended and discussed the State's view and where the State's responsibilities lay. Bill Hail and Steve Ravel from Venture Technologies spoke with our group about the future.
- 4) Will bring definitions and recommendations to the Advisory Committee in November.

b. 9-1-1 Communications [00:15:33]

Jonathan Brock

- 1) Met Thursday August 9th.
- 2) In the process of updating carrier contact information and reformatting to make it more user friendly for coordinators. Should have it out in the next two weeks.
- 3) Bo Jordan (Comcast) briefed out about the work that Alliance for Telecommunications Industry Solutions (ATIS) is doing for a best practices document for outage notifications.
- 4) Text to 911- Both King and Pierce County are aiming for an end of the year implementation.
- 5) Location Technology- Rapid SOS has partnered with Apple and will be rolling out a location technology embedded in the Apple IOS 12 which is due to be released in the fall. It will not assist in routing decisions. That is still a fully carrier-based process.
- 6) AT&T currently piloting an RTT (Real Time Text) delivery method to the PSAPs (Public-Safety Answering Points). First step is working out bugs. Next step is to work with handset vendors to have some of that code embedded in the system. Should have updates over the next couple months.
- 7) Questions-
  - Ms. Deb Flewelling (King)- Could you talk about spoofing calls?
    - ✓ Snohomish mentioned they were receiving a lot of robocalls via their 10-digit lines. Mr. Leneweaver cautioned against enrolling in the Do Not Call Registry because that registry tends to have the opposite effect, and many spoofed numbers actually exist and belong to people who are unaware that their number is being used. Blocking those numbers would consequently block the actual owner of the number from dialing 911.

c. Next Generation 9-1-1 (NG9-1-1) [00:22:10]

Katy Myers

- 1) Met on Tuesday, August 14th.
- 2) Rapid SOS short presentation, and spoke about IOS version 12, and spoke about their connection with Uber,
- 3) GIS (Geographic Information System) subcommittee came to talk about the NENA, GIS standard. Subcommittee adopted a recommendation for support.
- 4) Continuing work on the security requirements. Evolving P.1, P.2, P.3. Want to have at least a framework back to the AC in November.
- 5) Discussion about policy routing from Comtech.
- 6) Joint session with the 911 Communications subcommittee at the mega forum. We would like everyone to attend. It is titled "Eating the NG9-1-1 Elephant One Bite at a Time."
- 7) National 911 Program is asking for input on the NG9-1-1 Roadmap. Please go to 911.gov to provide input.
- 8) FCC is doing a real time text workshop on October 2<sup>nd</sup>. It is a live stream available on the FCC.gov website. Not sure what time. You are not required to register. Just go to the website.
- 9) Next meeting October 8th.

d. Policy [00:26:10]

Richard Kirton

- 1) Met August 15th.
- 2) Ms. Deb Flewelling (King) briefed AC on the grant work group
  - The final rules came out Friday, August 3rd. Workgroup has been meeting consistently. Quick update on timelines and tasks that we have going forward.

- ✓ Step 1: Certification and Diversion Forms completed by the State. This is for the Federal Grant; therefore, the State will be asking the counties and/or partners to also to fill out a certification and diversion form, which will need to be submitted by the counties and/or partners by September 5th.
  - ✓ Step 2: The application guidelines will be submitted to the Coordinators by the SECO by the 24th of August.
  - ✓ Step 3: Coordinators have until October 1st to complete submissions.
  - ✓ Step 4: The SECO will have until the end of November to complete their final application package to the feds.
  - ✓ Step 5: The Policy Subcommittee has agreed that the whole policy committee will be the vetting agent to work with the SECO. We are going to use weighted scoring.
- Priority Change- Statewide Public Education Campaign on NG9-1-1 type of applications. The focus on adding that is going to be in the supplemental section of the federal grant.

- If you have any questions or concerns, please reach out to one of us.
- Mr. Wasserman reiterated the two-step process. After the SECO submits the certification that we haven't diverted any funds in the last 180 days, they are going to see who is eligible for the funding throughout all the states and territories and will come back with a rough amount that WA can ask for. As we go through the application process our goal is to be as transparent as possible and help you along the way, so if you have any questions please reach out to anyone in the group. We want to get as much participation as possible.
- Questions- Ms. Criselia Grupp- Can you communicate what the period of the grant is?
  - ✓ It will be a 4-year grant period. September 30, 2022 is the end of the period. September 10th is the deadline to turn in the certification that no funds have been diverted and designate the SECO as the point of contact. Once they get that, the time to submit the entire grant package is between October to December. We would need to have our package in by November due to the hoops we would have to get it through, which is why we are asking the counties to have their asks in by October 1.
- Comment- Ms. Deb Flewelling (King) gave a quick reminder for the counties and partners considering doing this that there will be a 40% match which is outlined in the FAQs.
- Question- Mr. Tim Lenk (Pierce)- Are the counties going to be a subrecipient of this grant?
  - ✓ Yes. If a county has a project they are going to submit, it goes through the vetting process then that would be a pass through, which would require the SECO to monitor the grant and the money, how it's been spent and making sure that certain milestones are being met. If we ask for money for the ESInet (Emergency Services IP Network), that would be at the

state level, the state would meet that match, and if we do any collection; for instance if equipment refresh is something that comes up, and we have twenty eight counties that need it, we would likely go for a state ask so we could just take care of it and not have to have each individual county to pass through.

- Follow up- When we look at the match, is “In-Kind” match a part of the match process or is it a dollar match?
    - ✓ There is “In-Kind” match.
  - Question- Ms. Lisa Caldwell (Columbia)- Regarding match, when it comes to federal grants, can we use salary as a match or does the state consider that federal grant money?
    - ✓ We will need to look at that more in detail.
  - Comment- Mr. Tim Lenk- some counties have grant managers also, so what that coordination looks like between the State grant managers and the County grant managers for understanding the interpretation of the in kind and grant to grant match will be important also.
- 3) In addition to grant work we are also continuing with our regular work, reviewing and updating the policies/deliverables for the next fiscal year.
  - 4) The next regular meeting will be the Monday, October 8th, before the forum.
  - 5) We are also meeting Thursday, October 11th, of the forum.
  - 6) November 14th, we have an all-day meeting at Pierce County Emergency Management.

e. Training [00:41:22]

Tim Martindale

- 1) Subcommittee has been meeting quarterly.
- 2) Next meeting is August 21st at Camp Murray from 10am-noon.
  - Mega forum training schedule
  - Timeline for next training contracts so we can present them to the AC.

f. Geographic Information System (GIS) [00:42:34]

Chuck Buzzard

- 1) Met August 9th and discussed the final release of the NENA GIS data model. About two years ago, in lieu of a product from NENA, we put forth and the AC adopted a Washington state GIS data model that mirrored the NENA draft model. In July NENA finalized their data model, and so the topic of discussion last Thursday meeting was to discuss the changes to the GIS data Model. There are the five required layers, which we have been talking about for years, which are Road Centerlines, PSAP Boundary, and three Emergency Services boundaries. There are some slight modifications to field names, and what is mandatory vs. conditional vs. optional, but they are minor changes. Two major changes; they have added 2 more required data layers. One is a Provisioning boundary which outlines the area of the agency that is providing the GIS data. If there is a question or an update that is required, the spatial information function knows who to contact for those updates. For most counties that is just copying your PSAP boundary and adding data. The larger data set is the Site/Structure Address Points Layer. While that is going to be a large development process for some counties, the requirement right now is providing the data set with one point in it. There will be a period of time, which has not yet been determined, how you can populate it. If your road center line meets the 98% match rate, the address points do not really come into play. The important part of the address points is where you have discrepancies between a theoretical address model and what is actually on the ground. So, you might have houses that were addressed on the even side of the street with an odd address. We have asked the NG9-1-1 and Policy Committees to support the adoption of the NENA data model. We will make a recommendation to the AC to adopt the NENA data model in the future.
  - Question- Ms. Boggs- Do you think you will be ready for that by the next meeting in November?

- ✓ Yes, we are going to produce a survey and get it out to the counties to answer so we have some idea of where counties are on the development of a site structure address point layer. Most counties have something but most of them are not comfortable with making that available to 911 at this point, but other counties can match at 98% or better with their address points. There will probably be a request for some development funds for this, but it does not have to be done right now. The real priority is to focus on the address points that violate the theoretical address system.
- Follow up- Just off the top of your head, how many counties do you think meet the 98%?
  - ✓ Mr. Dan Miller (SECO)- Approximately three quarters.
- Ms. Deb Flewelling (King)- Is it true that if you are not at the 98% on your Roads file and you can fix the errors with a point data layer, that you can use the point data layer to identify and eliminate some of the errors we are getting?
  - ✓ Yes, the way it will work is it a compound locator. It is using both the address points and the roads center line, it's not "either/or," it is both.
- Follow up- Do your committee members understand that?
  - ✓ Yes, we have talked about it numerous times.

g. Strategic Planning [00:50:13]

Lisa Caldwell

- 1) Ms. Caldwell (Columbia) took a moment to recognize the Strategic Planning team. She spoke about what they have been working on regarding the vision and mission statement and stressed how important it is to get those right. The committee was hoping to have something to present to the AC today; however, they are not quite ready yet. The subcommittee will bring something to the next meeting for the AC to adopt at the November meeting, and will send out an email for review before the meeting takes place. Strategic Planning Subcommittee is working closely with NG911, Communications, Authorities and Policy Subcommittees.
- 2) Next Meeting on August 29th at the Pierce County Department of Emergency Management. Call-in option will be available.
- 3) Did not have Vanessa Barns (WSP) on subcommittee addition form. Would like to add her and will send in paperwork after the meeting.

h. Public Education [00:54:18]

Roxanne Castleman

- 1) Met August 3rd in Lewis County. Big focus point was creating an engagement campaign on Facebook to drive up awareness of 911 Public Education, especially as "Know your location," and "Text to 911" begin to roll out.
- 2) Talked about updating the Public Education Subcommittee Manual, to include current technology such as the emergency call button on our phones. Also including an Appendix about products and vendor list. As new members come on board, they are feeling like they have to do a lot of background work and research, when it has already been done.
- 3) Planning for meetings next year, and want to bring in some free trainers that are certified educators in the state to give us education strategies, marketing strategies etc.
- 4) Working on a Welcome Packet. Would like to have that available to roll out at the mega forum. So, when new members come in, they won't feel like they are playing "Catch up."
- 5) Ms. Katy Myers (Clark) invited Public Education subcommittee chair and vice chair to an NG9-1-1 Subcommittee meeting to talk about messaging moving forward. Do we use messaging that we already have or create new?

i. By-Laws [00:59:28]

Richard Kirton

1) Per the by-laws every July, we are supposed to look at population and adjust membership placement based on current population. With Teresa's help we did that. One county has grown beyond their current representation group. Clallam County used to be a rural county for subcommittee membership and a rural county for AC membership. The threshold for rural county designation is 75,000 and Clallam County's current estimated population is now 75,130, which moves their representation into the Urban Counties West group for the AC and into the Medium Urban Counties West group for Subcommittee representation. Mr. Kirton asks Subcommittee Chairs and AC members to make a note of that. We will distribute an updated list, that shows which counties are within which constituency group, shortly.

**VII. State Office Reports**

a. ESInet II Report [01:06:35]

Andy Leneweaver

1) Continues to cut over. Total of 42 PSAPs cut over to date. 28 cutovers scheduled and 14 have moved forward, another 14 were cancelled or rescheduled for various reasons. Majority of the cancelations were due to CPE (Customer Premises Equipment) readiness issues. The take away is that you have to work with your CPE vendors to be sure they are ready for the cutover. Due to the amount of rescheduling, there are no spots left on the transition calendar for this portion of the project. From here on out every cutover must go as scheduled. February 6th is our drop-dead date

to have all PSAPs transitioned over to ESInet II. February 7th all routing of ESInet I will end, and Comtech will have the full responsibility to get the calls to you. We can only complete two cutovers per week. Cutovers are taking less and less time. Whitman's neighboring agency in Idaho were using 10-digit ESInet I trunks, and reconfiguring them, which allowed them to remain dialable. Once ESInet I was disconnected, Idaho was no longer able to transfer calls back into Whitcom. We are now working with the State of Idaho and all the border PSAPs, to determine a better way to use 10-digit numbers. ESInet I has been switched back on in the interim.

- Question- With the thought that everyone has to transition, and you are only a quarter of the way through, what is the backup plan if we don't make it?
  - ✓ Shifting the ALI (Automatic Location Identification) cutover and the carrier cutover to the right. The project is set to complete in October; but the contract with the prior vendor remains open until the end of December.
- Follow up- If that were to happen, are there any additional costs that we would incur?
  - ✓ Probably.
- Follow up comment: This is why, when the state says, "be sure you work with your CPE (Customer Premises Equipment) so that you are ready when it is time for your PSAP (Public-Safety Answering Point) to cutover," it is very important that the coordinators take that seriously.
- Question- Has there been any discussion, since you are creating efficiencies in your current cutovers that if we do start to see some that we can maybe start to build three in a week rather than two and still keep that compressed?
  - ✓ Century Link has proposed an amendment to the contract that allows for rescheduling within 30 days.
- Follow up- Does Comtech have that ability?
  - ✓ Comtech would struggle... but yes.

### VIII. For the Good of the Order

- a. APCO (Association of Public-Safety Communications Officials)/NENA (National Emergency Number Association) Governmental Affairs [01:29:08] Keith Flewelling
  - 1) Working on certification- Mr. Karl Hatton (Jefferson) had a teleconference with some members of WASPC (Washington Association of Sheriffs and Police Chiefs). WASPC has had some opposition to APCO Project due to some fiscal issues. We are working with them to put some of their fears to rest, incorporating language ideas suggested by WASPC. Expect to have another phone call toward the end of August. Will go to a WASPC conference in November to present, with some of our WASPC allies, what has been accomplished. We are also going to be reaching back out to other agencies like Fire Chief's Association. Progress has been made.

    - ✓ Ms. Katy Meyers- If you are having a subcommittee meeting and you want to do an in person meeting you still allow the option that folks could call in on a conference bridge with shared screens.
