#### CALL TO ORDER and INTRODUCTIONS

## **REVIEW & APPROVAL OF PREVIOUS MINUTES**

Motion: Chandra Fox made a motion to approve the meeting minutes of February 2, 2018. John Ufford seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously and the meeting minutes were approved as written.

#### **WORKGROUPS AND STANDING REPORTS**

# Training Coordination (Hazmat Training) - Scott Lancaster; Stephanie Hakala

Scott reported that 500 responders were trained between October 2017-April 2018. This also includes hazmat training. There were 105 Participants at the HazMat Conference in April. During the conference, there were different training options, including the addition of Rail and Flammable Liquids course. Right now, they are in the process of figuring out the planning steps for next year's conference.

Stephanie reported there were a few bumps along the way for the conference, 118 people registered and 105 attended with 66 hotel rooms totaling \$16,000. The evaluations and feedback were good with a 97.5% approval rating.

#### **EPRCA Compliance & Outreach – Diane Fowler**

Diane Fowler from the Department of Ecology was introduced and is now the lead for EPCRA data reporting and related questions.

- March 1<sup>st</sup> was the due date for Tier II reporting. In April, a report was given to the LEPCs.
- There is a EPA delinquent list with less than 100 Tier II on the list.
- Diane stated that she will be giving and updated presentation on Thursday at the LEPC Conference at 0915.

#### Budget Reports/HMEP Grant Status - T.J. Rajcevich and Tirzah Kincheloe

T.J. reported that there are 0 expenditures, and there is \$20,000 that must be spent in full within two years. T.J. stated they need to decide how to spend \$40,000 by June 2019. There is \$150,000 for the update of the CBRNE/Response Plan.

T.J. also suggested a conference call to discuss how the money will be spent.

#### **LEPC Planning Status – Susan Forsythe**

One plan has been turned in since the last meeting. Dan Banks is assisting in reviewing plans. The WAC 118-40 rewrite is still in progress and continues to move forward.

# **NEW BUSINESS**

#### **CBRNE Update - Dan Banks, EMD**

Dan Banks reported there is a budget of \$150,000 to update the 2006 report. The original contractor is not operating any longer and EMD is going to reach out to previous workers to see if it will be possible to do the update with the current budget. There is a need for HazMat across the state and funding mechanisms change dramatically. They are hoping to have a report out to legislature by June 30, 2019. They are looking to resolve any logistical issues that may arise.

# Military Department/ National Guard HazMat Funding – Dan Banks, EMD on behalf of the National Guard

The Washington National Guard was appropriated \$200,000 for fiscal year 2019 and anticipate receiving another \$200,000 for fiscal year 2020. The National Guard, in collaboration with EMD decided to use the funding for HazMat training. . The Guard has created a workgroup and will report to the SERC.

#### Drug IQ Course - Scott Lancaster, WSP

The Drug IQ course was offered at the HazMat Conference in April. The course is originally 8 hours long and was broken down into two 4-hour courses for the conference and is available to anyone. The course covers fentanyl, opiates, and required PPE for incidents. The target audience is law enforcement and emergency medical services because they are engaged in initial HazMat response. Scott mentioned he can put on a class if anyone wants and this training can be pushed

out the LEPCs, healthcare professionals and the Seattle Emergency Management Drug Response Task Force.

#### **PRESENTATIONS**

## Western Regions SERC Meeting - Susan Forsythe, EMD

Susan, John Ufford, Chief Whealan and Kasia Pierzga attended. Susan asked for written feedback from stakeholders about how the SERC can optimize its support to the LEPCs.

Citizens Committee on Pipeline Safety – Ron Bowen, Citizens Committee on Pipeline Safety Ron mentioned that it was great to be back and see old friends. The CCOPS is a governor-appointed committee that meets on a regular basis to discuss, identify, review and highlight pipeline safety issues on a local and national level. The committee is made up of nine voting members representing the public, including local government and elected officials. Four non-voting members represent owners and operators of hazardous liquid and gas pipelines. Ron shared the most recent pipeline safety report which describes construction to emergency planning in regard to pipeline safety. The report was recently completed. The report notes that 29 of the counties in Washington State have pipelines and 15 of those counties are rapidly growing.

#### SERC SharePoint Site Update – Susan Forsythe, EMD

Susan described the technical challenge of posting external data with EMD's current SharePoint configuration. She presented her efforts work with the Military Department to overcome these challenges. The Military Department in the process of hiring someone. One the person is on board, the SERC site will be a priority. The plan is to have an external facing site where documents can be shared and saved, a dashboard for plans, standard operating procedures and allow the team to collaborate better.

#### NASTTPO Brief Out - Patrick Wicklund

This year's conference was in Oklahoma City, OK. There was good discussion on how we can write plans to avoid liability by making sure they are compliant with new federal policies and guidelines, particularly the American with Disabilities Act and ensuring access to underserved communities. Tim Gablehouse will talk about the legislative updates later in the conference. The U.S. Chemical Safety Board and the Department of Homeland Security gave excellent presentations on dangerous chemicals. The agenda can be found online.

#### **CLOSING REMARKS**

Chief Harris requested East and Westside LEPCs hold an open forum on what they are seeing in their jurisdictions.

Sean Davis, representing the Eastside LEPCs, reported that over the last 3 years they have been trying to do semi-regional partnerships and a Joint LEPC (Benton, Franklin, and Walla Walla). They are also trying to bring in new partners to incorporate significant events by using lessons learned, and improvements.

Regional HazMat counties (Yakima, Benton, Franklin, Walla Walla) are working on the commodity flow studies. They are also looking into figuring out Mutual Aid agreements.

Westside LEPC reported that the Seattle training has been good. They have been training with other HazMat teams and found their biggest challenges are bandwidth and time. They also reported that King County is looking to hire a Program Manager.

In response to a question concerning changes in Tier II reporting, Diane Fowler from Ecology reported that some facilities in Washington and even nationwide are using an older form. There has also been a change in the reporting system.

On behalf of EMD, John Ufford thanked U.S. Oil and Refining Co. for attending the meeting. Mike Harris thanked the guests and members for attending the meeting.
