The History of iCOOP

Prior to 2012

▶ The 2012 snow storm and Governor's Directive 12-20

Charter written and approved in February 2013
 Subsequently added to RCW 38.52
 Agencies file reports each quarter - Compliance
 TAG briefed each quarter on agency compliance / metrics and participation



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iCOOP Objectives

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- A) Improve the ability of state government to continue to provide essential functions and services under all conditions
- B) Define, identify, review, and prioritize state government essential functions, and services
 - C) Identify, review, and prioritize information technology systems, services, and requirements that support the essential functions identified in (b)
 - D) Build a shared understanding across state agencies of continuity activities, concepts, terms, and requirements. [strategies: education and standardization]
 - E) Enhance the coordination of continuity activities between state agencies
 - F) Map interdependencies between state agency continuity of operations plans and de-conflict incompatible planning assumptions




