REPORT OF EMECUTIVE SECTION 1 November 1950 - 31 October 1952

ADMINISTRATIVE: The Personnel Section of the Office of The Adjutant General has been reorganized in order to more efficiently handle the increased work load imposed upon this Section. This increase has been caused to a great extent by the induction of units into Federal service and their later return to State control, the induction or enlistment in the Regular Services of individual members of the Washington National Guard, and the greatly increased volume of requests from both individuals and components of the Armed Forces for verification of service, Certificates of Service, and other information obtainable from the files of the Military Department.

RECRUITING: Due primarily to the induction into Federal service of all Washington Air National Guard units and the 420th AAA Gun Battalion of the Washington National Guard (Army), the strength of the Washington National Guard is considerably less than that shown in the previous Biennial Report covering the period from November 1. 1948 to October 31, 1950. In addition, many National Guardsmen and other young men eligible for enlistment in the Washington National Guard have either enlisted in one of the regular components or have been inducted. In a State-wide recruiting campaign, terminating October 15, 1952, the results were definitely encouraging in that the increase in strength was considerably larger than that obtained during a similar campaign in 1951. Results varied throughout the State, being considered excellent in many localities. It is felt that a continued recruiting effort at unit level, employing the methods and recruiting aids used in the recent campaign will result in a further substantial increase in strength. Applicants for enlistment in the Air National Guard are more numerous than for Army units and no great difficulty is anticipated in bringing the Air units up to strength after they are returned to State control.

FEDERAL INSTRUCTORS: As of October 31, 1952, 19 officers and 22 enlisted men were assigned by the Department of the Army for duty with the Washington National Guard as instructors. The Army Instructor Group is headed by Colonel Don Riley, Inf, the Senior Army Instructor. Due to the induction of all Air units into Federal service, no instructors were assigned for duty with the Washington Air National Guard by the Air Force for the greater part of the period of this Report. On August 26, 1952, Colonel John L. Nedwed reported as Senior Air Instructor, three enlisted instructors are presently assigned for duty, and it is anticipated that additional instructor personnel will be assigned as the Air units are returned to State control and reactivated. It is estimated that the pay and allowances of instructors for the two-year period amounts to an expenditure from Federal funds of approximately \$600,000.00, which is not included in the report of the United States Property and Disbursing Officer.

ARRIORY DRILL PAY: Hembers of Washington National Guard Army units, during the two-year period, received approximately \$1,470,000.00 in armory drill pay, which is not included in the Report of the United States Property and Disbursing Officer, as payment is made by check directly to the individual by the Army Finance Officer designated to pay National Guard troops.

ACQUISITION OF ARLORY FACILITIES: On November 15, 1950, land and buildings located in Bremerton and Port Orchard were deeded to the State of Washington, Wilitary Department by the Federal Government through the Public Housing Administration. These buildings were formerly recreation centers for housing projects, and provide excellent armory facilities for the National Guard units stationed at Bramerton and Port Orchard. The value of the land and buildings is estimated at \$300,000.00.

This apparent "loss" of personnel of National Guard units while in Active Federal service was due generally to the fact that practically all the officer personnel and a considerable proportion of the enlisted personnel elected to remain in Active Federal service indefinitely. In addition, many enlisted men were honorably discharged from active military service by reason of expiration of term of enlistment contract prior to the return of their parent units to State control. This extensive "loss" of Guard personnel requires a complete reorganization and rebuilding of Guard units after their return to State control.

The Field Training Fncampment of the Air National Guard was held at Camp Murray, Fort Levis, Washington, 14 to 28 June 1952, inclusive. The unit participating was Hq Wash Air National Guard. Attendance: 2 officers and 7 Airmen.

SERVICE SCHOOLS AND EXTENSION COURSES: During the past two year period 358 officers and enlisted men of the Washington National Guard attended Service Schools. These schools were conducted by both the Army and the Air Force at various localities in the United States, with courses ranging from a few days to nine months duration.

During the same period 226 officers and 530 enlisted men were enrolled in the Army Extension Courses.

ANNUAL ARMORY INSPECTIONS: During Fiscal Year 1951, there were 7 units rated as "Superior", no units rated "Unsatisfactory", in the Annual Armory Inspection made by the Inspector General representing the Commanding General, Sixth Army. In Fiscal Year 1952, 7 units were rated "Superior" and 18 units rated "Unsatisfactory". The ratings of "Unsatisfactory" were given because the units were below the required minimum strength.

WASHINGTON STATE GUARD: As outlined in previous report dated 24 November 1950, the policy of commissioning battalion commanders and one officer per company in the State Guard to form a ready cadre has been continued. As of 1 November 1950, there were 36 officers commissioned in the Washington State Guard, and on 31 October 1952, there were 37 officers.

These officers, as commissioned, were placed on a State Guard drill status with a primary duty assignment of organizing, on paper only, the units which they

will command. Actual enlistments were not authorized.

Due to the failure of Congress to extend Public Law 849, 81st Congress, which amended the National Defense Act for a period of two years to permit states to organize military forces other than National Guard units, all officers of the Washington State Guard were transferred to the Washington State Guard Reserve, effective September 15, 1952.

DISASTER RELIEF: No use of National Guard troops for major disaster relief was necessary during the period covered by this report. The Washington National Guard Civil Defense and Disaster Relief Plan has been revised and distributed to all Washington National Guard units and liaison established with other agencies concerned.

Approximately 360 officers and enlisted men of units of the Washington National Guard from Bellingham, Everett, Seattle, Kirkland, and Puyallup, were called out by the Governor on 11 February 1951, for three-day flood duty in the Mount Vernon and Kent-Auburn areas.

National Guard personnel have also been called upon to assist in fighting forest fires, searching for lost persons, and in food drops by plane to Fire Lookout Stations.

REPORT OF PERSONNEL SECTION 1 November 1950 - 31 October 1952

Effective 1 January 1951, the Operations and Training and Military Personnel Section was reorganized into two separate sections, namely, the Operations and Training Section and the Personnel Section. The newly appointed Chief of Personnel Section was charged with the responsibility of supervision and administration of the consolidated functions of the following sub-sections:

Officer Personnel (Army & Air NG): Processing applications for appointment, promotion and reappointment of officers and warrant officers; supervision of Federal Recognition Examining Boards and Technical Waiver Boards; processing of officers' efficiency reports and annual reports of annual physical examinations; maintenance of officers' 201-files; processing requests for reassignment, separation and/or transfer to and from the Inactive NG; preparation and submission of required reports.

Enlisted Personnal (Army & Air NG): Processing and transmittal to CNGB of enlistment records and end-of-the-month morning reports; maintenance of enlisted 201-files; effecting inter-unit transfers, separations, and transfers to and from Inactive NG; preparation of statements of service; preparation and submission of required reports.

Mail and Records: Maintains the central correspondence files of The Adjutant General's Office; acts as message center for receipt and distribution of all incoming and out-going and inter-office correspondence; makes initial distribution of all official AGO publications and orders; and maintains the AGO Records Library which contains a copy of each Federal regulation, field and training manuals or directives, with changes thereto, issued for the National Guard by the Departments of

the Army and Air Force or their intermediate commanders, National Guard Bureau publications and directives, and AGO publications and orders.

Mimeographing: Cuts stencils for and reproduces all official AGO publications and orders for initial distribution through Mail and Records Sub-section; reproduction of other miscellaneous papers for which pre-cut stencils are received from other sections, the RA Instructor Group, and/or Wash NG units.

PBX and Teletypewriter: Routes all in-coming and out-going telephone calls: receives and routes to proper Section Chief all incoming teletype messages, and are a cri time a genigie rainignegen i s'entrener ime

transmits outgoing teletype messages.

REPORT OF MAINTENANCE, CONSTRUCTION AND ENGINEERING SECTION 1 November 1950 - 31 October 1952

To prevent further deterioration of buildings, the Military Department has begun a preventive maintenance program. Whereas the previous biennial appropriation was insufficient to permit preventive maintenance, the appropriation for the current biennium was large enough to include preventive maintenance to a limited degree. This program has of necessity been limited to roof, electrical, and heating plant repairs. Many armories are thirty to forty years old, and heating and electrical systems have deteriorated to the extent that major repairs or replacements have become necessary. Many roofs had previously been patched and repatched on a temporary basis because of lack of funds to completely renovate them.

Under the maintenance program the roofs at 24 installations were repaired at a cost of approximately \$33,000.00. Heating plants were repaired, replaced or installed at 13 locations at a cost of approximately \$17,000.00. \$3,500.00 was spent on repair of electrical installations at 4 stations. Paint was purchased for redecoration of 3 armories at a cost of \$2,500.00. The exterior of buildings at Vancouver Barracks were painted under contract at a cost of \$4.375.00.

The Poulsbo armory was completed with an expenditure of \$25,832.41. A building at Okanogan was leased for an armory and a remodeling project in the amount of \$12,087.86 has been completed. These two projects have provided very adequate facilities for two companies at a relatively small cost to the State.

Land for a proposed armory at Wenatchee was donated to the Military Department by the Wenatchee Junior College. This proposed armory is included in a construction program to be financed by 75% Federal and 25% State funds. Federal money is now available to the State for the first four (4) armories. Bills are being drafted for presentation to the next Session of the Legislature to enable the Military Department to secure these needed facilities.

Funds have been made available by the National Guard Bureau to complete the following projects during this period:

This is a total of more than \$350,000.00 Federal funds that have been approved for construction in this State during this period.

An adequate budget has been submitted for maintenance, repair and construction for the next biennium. If these funds are made available a more extensive maintenance and construction program can be accomplished.

REPORT OF FINANCE SECTION 1 November 1950 - 31 October 1952

During the period of this report a total of \$1,005,588.71 was expended from State funds for the support of the Organized Militia of Washington. These expenditures do not include federal allotments handled through the Office of the Acting United States Property and Disbursing Officer, whose statement is contained elsewhere in this report.

There is set forth below a brief summary of disbursements from all appropriations in effect during the period of this report, including local funds which are used to supplement these appropriations. This statement covers overlapping portions of two biennial periods, the previous biennium from 10/1/50 to 3/31/51, and the current biennium from 4/1/51 to 9/30/52:

In order to aid the states in maintaining certain air and army National Guard installations, the Department of Defense has authorized the issuance of Service Contracts on a 75%-25% basis, whereby the states are reimbursed for 75% of the costs of maintenance, repair and operation of facilities for the housing of these units. This Department was able to arrange Service Contracts covering certain facilities located at Bellingham, Camp Murray, Ephrata, Geiger Field, Fort Lewis, Pasco; Seattle, Vancouver and Walla Walla. During the period of this report this Department has received back as reimbursement from the Federal government the sum of \$86,023.17. Local funds being reimbursed in the amount of \$76,472.83; and appropriations in the amount of \$9,550.34, which was forwarded to the State Treasury.

The records of this Department indicate that the average monthly payroll has remained more or less stationary at 68 employees during the period of this report. Deducting the salary of The Adjutant General which is set by law, the average salary of all employees was approximately \$226.35 per month.

REPORT OF THE UNITED STATES PROPERTY AND DISBURSING OFFICER 1 November 1950 - 31 October 1952

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During the period of this report, the United States Property and Disbursing Officer Section has performed the assigned functions of requisitioning and accounting for Tederal funds, acting as Federal Contracting and Transportation Officer, and providing units of the Washington National Guard with all Federal supplies and equipment required for them to accomplish their training mission and to

be prepared for their "M" day assignments.

During the period of this report, four Army units, plus all of the Air National Guard units, were recalled to active military service. This required a great deal of additional work in shipping the property to the active military service, thus relieving the State of responsibility for this property and clearing all unit commanders of their responsibility for this property. At the present time these units are returning to State control. This requires that certain items of property be requisitioned for them and new supply accounts be established for them.

In addition to the regular prescribed functions, logistical support has been furnished for other civilian components during their summer field training period.

During the past year all World War II type vehicles have been turned in, and are being replaced with new type vehicles, the same as those presently issued to units of the regular services. In addition to vehicles, many other items of equipment such as Signal Corps radios, Ordnance weapons, etc., have been recalled by the Regular Army. Many of these items are scheduled for replacement during the early part of 1953.

The United States Property and Disbursing Officer is required to inventory and audit every unit property account at least once each year, or upon each change of commanding officer. During the period of this report, approximately 188 such audits have been completed. Each audit consists of a complete physical inventory

of all property issued to that unit.

In accomplishing the projects and functions listed above, the following Federal funds have been expended:

REPORT OF STATE MAINTENANCE POOL ACTIVITIES 1 November 1950 - 31 October 1952

The State Maintenance Pool, under the direction of the State Maintenance Officer, operates repair and maintenance facilities for all Federal equipment issued to the Washington National Guard. These facilities and their locations are as follows:

- a. State Maintenance Pool Shops Camp Murray, Fort Lewis, Wash.
- b. Equipment Concentration Site Camp Murray, Fort Lewis, Wash.
- c. Service Centers, three (3) each at Seattle, Spokane, and Vancouver, Washington.
- d. Army Aviation Section, Gray Field, Fort Lewis, Washington.

The equipment maintained includes approximately one-thousand (1,000) vehicles of all types ranging from motor scooters to tanks and self-propelled artillery weighing up to forty-six (46) tons, all types of artillery, approximately nine-thousand (9,000) small arms, fire control equipment which includes all items from watches to very complex electronic directors for computing data for anti-aircraft firing. There are approximately two-thousand (2,000) items of signal equipment, which covers items from field telephones, all types of radios to radar sets mounted in twelve (12) ton vans. In addition, there are several thousand other miscellaneous items.

During the period of 1 November 1950 through 31 October 1952, the following items were processed through the State Maintenance Pool Shop at Camp Murray:

Vehicles - 3,023 Artillery - 297 Small Arms - 5,719 Signal - 2,336 Miscellaneous 6,917

These repairs range from minor repairs to complete rebuild of equipment.

Contact Teams, from the State Maintenance Shop, visit all units of the Washington National Guard at least once a year to inspect equipment and arrange for necessary repairs. In addition, they make additional visits to units to make repairs at the unit station where it is more economical than evacuating equipment to Camp Murray.

The Concentration Site operated at Camp Murray provides for the storage of equipment issued to units, but not required for use at the unit's Armory during the training year. This equipment is issued to units prior to Summer Camp and turned back at the close of camp. Maintenance of this equipment during the year is also performed by personnel of this organization. All steps are taken to prevent any deterioration of this equipment while in storage.

Service Centers are operated for the minor repair of vehicles at Seattle, Spokane and Vancouver. These are small shops designed to assist personnel from National Guard units in that vicinity in the performance of maintenance of their vehicles, and to perform additional maintenance to avoid unnecessary evacuation of vehicles to the parent shop at Camp Murray.

The Army Aviation Section at Gray Field, Fort Lewis, Vashington, consists of twelve (12) light aircraft at the present time. These aircraft are also maintained by the State Maintenance Pool. A supervisor who is a rated pilot and airplane maintenance technicians are on duty at this installation. Aircraft are dispatched to using organizations throughout the State on a rotation basis, all maintenance

being performed at Gray Field. Aircraft from this section proved very beneficial to the State Forestry Department during the fire seasons of 1951 and 1952. Frequent flights were made to patrol and observe major forest fires. Forest fire fighters were supplied by parachute with food, water, sleeping bags, clothing and cooking utensils, in addition to fire fighting equipment. State forestry lookout stations were also supplied in this manner.

Maintenance of National Guard equipment is a full time project with the ultimate goal of having all equipment in a safe operating condition at all times. This point has been reached each year for the Annual Summer Encampment of the Guard. At the close of camp the problem of inspecting, scheduling, and evacuation of equipment to Camp Murray begins. Equipment is scheduled for repair over a full year. All equipment is maintained in accordance with directives published by the Departments of the Army and the Air Force.

This maintenance organization is operated with a force of seventy-four (74) employees, including clerical and supervisory personnel. This covers all sections enumerated above in addition to the office of the State Maintenance Officer. The payroll for this organization for the period covered by this report was \$530.097.12. which is allocated to the State of Washington by the Federal government.
