Opening Remarks & Review of Agenda:



Pandemic AAR Roadmap - Timeline 2022-2023







Kerstyn Dolack described the interim report. The report provides an overview of the COVID-19 pandemic in Washington. The report also describes the legislative proviso, the Task Force responsibilities, and the AAR timeline. The Military Department has received over half of the AARs. Organizations that have not submitted their AARs will be contacted shortly.

- Fernando Martinez: We are trying to develop a plan that will be applicable to many catastrophes. Could this emergency response be applicable to incidents such as those in Uvalde, Texas? This is a catastrophe that can happen anywhere.
 - Nate Weed: There are many layers to this. The easy answer is "yes." The way that we evaluate our response to COVID will allow us to do better in any response. How do we communicate effectively? Address equity? Access and prioritize resources? Certain things are required in short, sudden incidents that are not required in a pandemic. We need to be paying attention to responses to these incidents so that we can include details in our plans.
- Fernando Martinez: That's what I was looking for. How do we immediately respond so that we can protect children and communities?
 - Nate Weed: This situation is so tragic. My team at the DOH is working to ensure that our plans and procedures are up to date, in case this happens in Washington.

Legislative Categories B-H Gallery Walk:

Phyllis Shulman invited the Task Force to participate in the Legislative Categories B-H Gallery Walk. In breakout groups, the Task Force answered the following question for each of the categories: What are examples of important issues/lessons to explore under this topic?

- Angie Hinojos: We often talk about DEI separately. We need to change that. DEI has to be part of every conversation and every topic. It feels like we're not integrating it into our thinking. We should call it out with everything we say. That's my ask: That we try to integrate it intentionally into every conversation and everything we say.
 - Ekkarath Sisavatdy: Language access should go hand-in-hand with every area we are discussing. We need to support people with a lack of English proficiency.
 - Christina Sanders: Many of us agree. DEI should be part of everything we do.
 What does that look like in terms of actual steps and actions? We don't want to
 move forward thinking we are including everyone, only to look back again and
 see that we have left people behind.
- Angie Hinojos: Thank you for reiterating that.
- Fernando Martinez: During the pandemic, there was no support for families in isolation when there was abuse. There was no mechanism by which these families could get support. How did the pandemic affect businesses in communities of color? More importantly, how did it affect the families of these businesses? I'd like to see the economic impacts of shutdowns. I haven't seen anything come from the state. How do we compare to other states? Those are things I'd like to see.
- Winona Hauge: It was clear that DEI was a central factor that created neglect in underserved communities of color. There was an issue before the pandemic: The pandemic of racism, inequity, and division. Resources slowly trickle down to our community. Children are a year or two behind in school. These things didn't happen because of the pandemic. These things were already happening and were uncovered. Where is the health justice? How is this group going to center the pandemic that was already here, that is disproportionately impacting communities of color and other underserved communities? Those are things we should center on. What did the state do? What has the state done? The governor did take some action. We will hopefully take some action. If we keep making pandemic policies that don't address the central issue of race, we can't solve institutional racism. It's an elephant in the room.
- Tristan Allen: It will be imperative to look at A-H through an equity lens. We should unpack the ways communities of color were disproportionately impacted. Where were impacts felt? Where did the governor miss opportunities?

Closing Remarks:

Phyllis Shulman thanked the Task Force for its participation. She reminded the Task Force that the AAR website will be updated to include materials from this meeting.





- Winona Hauge: Thank you for bringing Kevin Baker. Will he play a bigger role?
 - Phyllis Shulman: Yes, Kevin is from a consulting firm and brings an equity perspective. He will also help facilitate.
- Winona Hauge: I assumed that we would center DEI. I hope, moving forward, that other people will value DEI as well. Thank you.
- Nate Weed: Thank you for helping us through this process.
