Washington SECC Meeting Minutes

March 12, 2024

The meeting was called to order at 9:36 AM by Chair Ted Buehner. The previous minutes were approved. There were no additions to the agenda.

Announcements

The September meeting will be moved to the third Tuesday, the 17th, due to a conflict with the <u>WSEMA</u> conference. The May meeting will be in Ellensburg at KITTCOM.

The newly updated and expanded <u>Puget Sound Emergency Radio Network</u> (PSERN) has been launched. Multiple agency communication is the focus for this system, permitting them to talk with each other.

The Washington State EAS plan was submitted to the FCC ARS system in June 2022. The original FCC plan was to have an annual update in ARS. However, there has been no further word from the FCC. Less than half of states have completed their original submission. We will continue to keep WA-PAWS up to date and update ARS when informed to do so.

Old Business

Our May meeting will be in person and at a central location permitting all across the state to attend and will be held at KITTCOM in Ellensburg. Some commented that the Zoom feed last year from Central Washington University was less than optimal, in part since Scott could not be there with his audio/visual equipment to support the Zoom hybrid meeting.

WA-PAWS TABS

Tabletop Exercises: Ted sent out an updated version soon after the January meeting.

Bylaws – Nothing new.

Tab F-4 Technical FAQ - Scott has been working on the FAQ for the SAGE unit.

<u>WA-PAWS</u> is a living breathing document subject to frequent updates. If you see something that needs an update, please send a note to the remailer.

The long-awaited SAGE software update was released and was to be installed by March 11th. It was fairly simple for most units. There were some issues with older operating systems, solved by a simple file available from SAGE.

The RMT reminders sent monthly have been quite helpful and sharply reduced missed RMTs by local jurisdictions.

New Business

A new WEA code for missing endangered persons has been proposed. WSP's Carri has been working with her former counter-part in California (who now works for FEMA). He has been gathering input on how some states are using WEA for missing/endangered persons alerts - a relatively new discussion. This could be part of the <u>Ashanti</u> Project. Some tribal governments have also proposed something similar to allow for the alerting of missing and endangered tribal members. Their recommendation is going to be that this would be a lower level (or WEA Lite) alert. These could be turned off, be less intrusive, and have fewer people turn them off. See the FCC NPRM here. Dr. Jeannette Sutton, the founder of The Warn Room and an associate professor at the University at Albany,, will be giving presentations on IPAWS AWARE at the upcoming Partners in Emergency Preparedness Conference in April. She has been working with FEMA to improve IPAWS and WEA messaging. Dr. Sutton will share new developments in alert and warning research and practice, and show the latest technology that will enable risk communicators to design and disseminate effective messages. FEMA IPAWS will also be there as an exhibitor.

Keith Shipman was in Washington DC recently meeting with other broadcaster association executives. They met with Manny Centeno from FEMA to discuss missing and endangered alerts. Keith informed them what Washington State does - accept the messages but do not run them as EAS or WEA alerts. The information is shared with news organizations so that the information is disseminated, very effectively. Nationally, this new proposal is being driven politically by the current FCC Chairman. All 50 states pushed back on this proposal and Manny will take their response back to FEMA and Homeland Security authorities. Keith's position is this process should be carried out nationally as done in Washington, protecting the system so broadcasters will participate. Broadcaster participation is voluntary except for presidential messages. There is also a proposal for multi-language alerts. There is pushback because they are trying to expand EAS way beyond the EAN, putting a burden on

broadcasters. Carri said law enforcement believes WEA should only be used in a serious, life threating situation so that they don't overwhelm and lose public involvement.

Monte and Simone are working on creating a WA-PAWS tab to provide further guidance for Amateur Radio in public alert and warning. Many counties are expanding their auxiliaries. Many people may not know the capabilities of amateur radio operators and what they do. This tab could be especially helpful for smaller counties. Cities and tribal entities should also be included. The SHARES program should also be included.

The National Weather Service and the Washington State Patrol had a recent successful NWEM test. Eventually AMBER Alerts will be broadcast over NOAA Weather Radio stations. Past test issues have been addressed and resolved. They are working on implementing the alerts at the four NWS offices that serve the state. This capability is available nation-wide, but it is up to the individual states whether it is actually implemented locally.

The State Relay Network (SRN) is still not operating. The SAGE box at the state is not connected to the system that feeds the network. Has the time come to pull the plug on the SRN? It has been down a long time and there have been few if any complaints about it not working. Also, receivers are hard to find. It is unknown how many stations are actually monitoring it. However, it is important to keep the analog backup systems going. The WSAB will send out a survey to find out how many are monitoring the analog SRN and LRN's (Local Relay Network).

Committee Reports

Tech: Lowell reports that he has not been receiving RMT's from Lewis County. They stopped about the same time as Alert Sense was dropped at the state. He is wondering if they would be able to get a real alert out if they had to.

Local Area Reports

For the Coastal area, they missed their March RMT due to another event that took precedence. More stations have started monitoring their LRN.

In the Cowlitz/Wahkiakum area, Wahkiakum County has a new Emergency Management coordinator, Austin Smith.

The Inland Northwest LECC will be meeting in April. They will only be meeting in person once a year.

In Kittitas County, apparently LECC Chair Brad Tacher no longer works for KXLE. George Long will be reaching out to find his replacement.

In the Mason/Thurston local area, they are working to get another meeting going.

The North Puget area successfully sent their monthly test. Their usual Legacy Alertsense interface was gone, but they were able to use the IPAWS interface with no problems.

There is some question whether all the counties in the state have the ability to send IPAWS Alerts. According to FEMA, all the counties in Washington have the capability, but it is unknown if they have been properly set up. They might be sending alerts and not have them go anywhere.

In Skagit Co, they are testing regularly so their people get the chance to run them. It helps with their redundancy and allows different people to be able to do different jobs.

As a reminder, the RMT reminders go out on the remailer. If you aren't subscribed to the remailer you will not receive them.

As a clarification, stations are not required to run all RMT's generated in their coverage area. They are only required to relay one test a month and usually they will air the test that is from the area their studio is in. Also, they have up to one hour to relay the test.

Stakeholder Reports

At the National Weather Service, Andy Brown from their Spokane office has been promoted to Meteorologist-in-Charge and the process of hiring a new Warning Coordination Meteorologist is underway. On March 5th, the Portland office released their new public zones, reconfiguring their alerting areas. Seattle will be doing the same in September. More information is in the chat below.

From the Washington State Association of Broadcasters, the FCC is planning to reinstate the Equal Opportunity Employment Form. This would be part of the public file. Broadcasters are opposed because it would allow special interest groups to scrutinize hiring practices.

Other Business

The Partners In Emergency Preparedness Conference will be April 2, 3 & 4. See more information here. One of the presentations will be Keith's counterpart

from Hawaii talking about the public alert and warning issues during the Maui fire storm.
